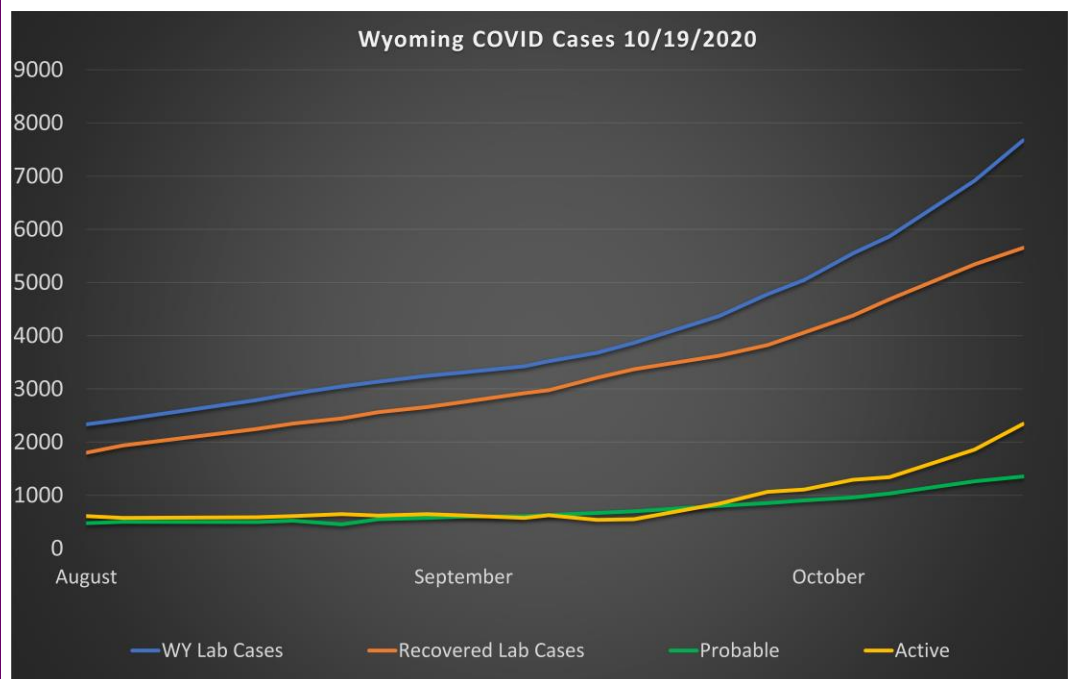

COVID-19 SYMPTOMS

People with COVID-19 have had a wide range of symptoms reported – ranging from mild symptoms to severe illness. Symptoms may appear 2-14 days after exposure to the virus. People with these symptoms may have COVID-19:

- Cough
- Shortness of breath or difficulty breathing
- Fever
- Chills
- Muscle pain
- Sore throat
- New loss of taste or smell

This list is not all possible symptoms. Other less common symptoms have been reported, including gastrointestinal symptoms like nausea, vomiting, or diarrhea. If you have symptoms, please contact your healthcare provider and GET TESTED!

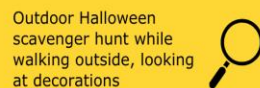
From the CDC, a ranking of Halloween activities by COVID-19 risk



LOWER RISK



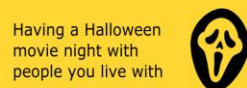
Carving or decorating pumpkins with members of your household OR outside with neighbors or friends, keeping a safe distance



Outdoor Halloween scavenger hunt while walking outside, looking at decorations



Virtual Halloween costume contest



Having a Halloween movie night with people you live with



Having a scavenger hunt for treats with your household members in or around your home



Decorating your house, apartment, or living space

MODERATE RISK

One-way trick-or-treating with individually wrapped goodie bags



Outdoor costume parade with social distancing

Outdoor party w/ face masks and social distancing



Open-air, one-way, walk-through haunted forest with face masks & social distancing

Visiting pumpkin patches or orchards where people use hand sanitizer, face masks and social distancing



Having an outdoor Halloween movie night with local family & friends + social distancing

HIGHER RISK



Traditional trick-or-treating where treats are handed to children who go door to door



Handing out candy from trunks of cars lined up in large parking lots



Attending crowded costume parties held indoors

Going to an indoor haunted house where people may be crowded together and screaming



Going on hayrides or tractor rides with people who are not in your household

Traveling to a rural fall festival that is not in your community if you live in an area with community spread of COVID-19
